Chaplaincy Welcomes Four New Chaplains

The Chaplaincy is pleased to introduce four new chaplains who joined our ranks recently. Chaplain Jody Brown comes to us with knowledge and experience as he served as Head Chaplain for the Fredericksburg Police Department in Texas for six years. He also has a solid background in ministry and a heart for youth. He is now a law enforcement chaplain for Hamilton County and will be on-call Monday evenings through morning to assist officers and the community if needed at an accident or crime scene or to deliver any death or serious illness notifications. Chaplains Pamela Mallory, Don Schauwecker, and Chuck Stout volunteer as our Jail chaplains visiting inmates and offering them Bibles, resources, and spiritual counseling. Chaplain Pamela Mallory came to us to volunteer and is now serving as our female Jail chaplain. She brings a wealth of experience in the trenches of life and has a heart for social work. We have already seen a connection with the women that is real and personal. She visits the women inmates on Tuesday mornings. Chaplain Don Schauwecker has been a volunteer for the Chaplaincy for five years. He teaches Bible studies in both the Jail and Community Corrections. Don has shown a heart for the incarcerated and dedication to the Chaplaincy. Chaplain Chuck Stout comes to us with experience in law enforcement. He was at the Indiana Department of Corrections Juvenile Division for five years and also served as a corrections officer for six years at the Minnesota Department of Corrections in St. Cloud. Chaplains Don and Chuck both visit the men weekly. The Chaplaincy looks forward to seeing how God will use them in the years to come.

2017 Was a Successful Year for the Chaplaincy

The Hamilton County Sheriff's Chaplaincy had a busy 2017. We hosted our annual Sheriff's Chaplaincy Conference in October training 94 chaplains and 25 departments from Indiana, Michigan, and Ohio. The Chaplaincy also oversaw 225 community volunteers, who conducted Bible studies, Christian Intervention, AA classes, and the Alpha Course (which is a mentoring program that helps inmates find employment, housing, and a church upon release from incarceration) at the Jail and Community Corrections. Its volunteers also conducted Bible studies at the Juvenile Detention Center. At the Jail 4,175 inmates attended classes and 2,024 residents of

Community Corrections attended Chaplaincy programming. In addition, the Chaplaincy also answered 3,260 inmate requests for spiritual services. In June the Chaplaincy directed its largest yet Chaplain Tom Burton Junior Law Enforcement Academy with 134 children from law enforcement families and their friends. There were 62 volunteers who helped lead the one-day camp, which applies the Word of God to the law enforcement experience.
